


This Design Team Raised The Bar In Residential Design With Their Serious Background And Whimsical Approach

wo of them met at UCLA design school where people often got them confused with one another. Blonde, stylish and nice, Heidi Bonesteel and Michele Trout are today the creative team behind Bonesteel Trout Hall Interiors.

Post graduation, Trout headed off to work on luxury hotels at Wilson & Associates and James Northcutt Associates, while Bonesteel focused on high end residential projects for a prominent builder in Orange County. Both women know a lot about construction with Trout having built three houses of her own. Their partner, Jill Hall, has also built several custom homes. In fact, it is Hall's bottom line approach that makes her ideal for overseeing the operational side of the business. As Trout says, "Jill gives us our wings. She keeps the creative process tight and organized."

The clients of Bonesteel Trout Hall come in two typical types: their piers—young families designing a home to grow into; and sophis-



ticated couples working on their third or fourth home. Regardless to their station in life, their clients continually inspire Bonesteel and Trout who relish the "ta da!" at the end of a job. Trout recalls a project in Newport Beach, California where the children came home from school and ran throughout the house from room to room with gigantic smiles across their faces. What more can one ask for?

Interestingly, it was the childhood ambitions of both Bonesteel and Trout to become designers. As a young girl, Bonesteel continu-



ally redecorated her bedroom time and time again, while Trout was making miniature houses out of shoeboxes.

When asked today, what well appointed room inspires them they reply, the lobby lounge at The Peninsula Beverly Hills designed by James Northcutt. Trout recalls how "Its butter yellow sofas and exquisite surroundings exude comfort and luxury, something we strive for in our own work."

pletion on their ideal new office space; a contemporary studio perched on a hill with open views to the ocean. Crisp white walls are set off by vaulted ceilings and sea grass floors. It is no surprise that sea grass and grass cloth are forever favorites as both designers claim they couldn't live without their box of over two hundred much used samples in their office.

Regardless of time demands and deadlines, Bonesteel and Trout agree the most important thing any designer can do is travel. And that they do together, too. Bonesteel says, "Our trips to London, Paris, Venice and Mexico have not only influenced our style but also inspired entire projects." This summer the pair will be sticking a bit closer to home with a design trip to The Hamptons.

When approaching a residential project, their first step is selecting a random image for its palette and theme that will carry through to completion. The image is used as a constant reference point for the designers and clients alike. In the past, a picture of a gorgeous bowl of fruit has been chosen as has a grouping of beautiful garden roses.
